Dear Families,

This term in our worships, we have been thinking about how being resilient can help us to achieve more. We have learnt about a range of people who have all shown great resilience in their personal stories, from Malala to Harry Kane and a host of other people whose stories have inspired many. We have thought about how being resilient is like being a bouncy ball that springs back up after being dropped, or being strong enough to "bounce back" from tough times. We also know that keeping going when things are tricky is important as that helps us to learn. A key feature of many of the stories we have heard is that we must work hard and never give up hope. Resilience is one of our school values and we work to develop this in all of our children as we know that it will aid them greatly not only in school but in life beyond our school doors.

This week, we have also thought about Children's Mental Health week in our classrooms. The theme this year is belonging and what that means to children. Belonging is important to us and we want our children to feel that they belong to our school community where they are loved, respected and celebrated for being themselves.

This term, the Sunflower children have shown a wonderful fascination with dinosaurs and their environment. They were set the challenge to make a dinosaur world to play with. After looking at books and discussing what the dinosaurs needed in their environment, we set to work creating this land, following instructions of how to use new materials, sharing equipment and displaying our creative skills.

This was extended to learn about volcanoes, looking at cross section pictures, watching eruptions on the big screen and carrying out our own science experiments pretending we were making our own volcanoes.











We have been making the most of our weather. We have wrapped up warm, putting our independence skills to the test, ready to play in the snow. We have learnt about temperature, how it changes and how to measure it using a thermometer. The children explored the outdoor blocks and the massive, muddy puddles in the 'Big' playground.

We also have discussed how we can look after outdoor animals when the weather is so wet and cold and made bird food to help them.

I hope you all have a restful half term and look forward to Term 4.

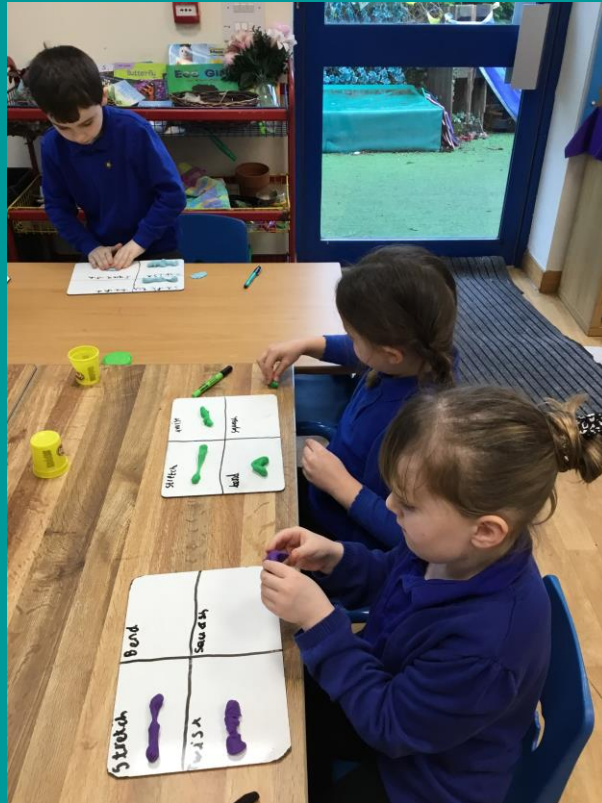

## ELSA News



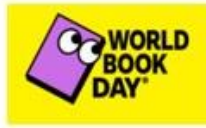
